I have a lot of faith in your capabilities because you have been prepared to be the best after going through great minds of scholars available at this premier institution. I congratulate you.

It takes a great deal of investment, and high risks, to produce one qualified graduate. This University has produced over 9,000 graduates this year (having held another graduation ceremony in September) and in the process made our country richer.

The availability of skilled manpower to attend to the divergent needs of modern society, including globalization, technological advancement, climate change and a myriad complex socio-economic issues, is one of the key pillars for accelerating development.

To the staff of our esteemed University, and other stakeholders who made this happen, I say "Well done!". I specifically want to commend the parents, quardians and other benefactors for the worthy investments in these young people. The government of H. E. I appreciate the fact that you gave your contributions to the Working Party, which must have been an integral part in making the recommendations. I urge you to make more submissions as so long as the window of doing so is open.

Already, the issue of financing higher education has featured prominently during the public participation forums.

The government is conscious of the need to make our universities sustainable, but I also know that Universities have great potential to utilize their internal capacities to overcome their perennial financial deficits.

I want to congratulate the University of Nairobi leadership for initiating reforms geared towards enhancing your financial health.

Given that your students are currently the primary sources of revenue, it is imperative that you develop marketable and relevant programs that can attract students from all corners of the globe. I also challenge the University of Nairobi to direct more energy in research as an alternative business solution. Research is where you have more competitive advantage.

As you conclude your journey as a student, I urge you to use the knowledge that you have acquired from this University sufficiently. Use it to make the world a better place! Seize all the opportunities that come your way. Build relationships and be patriotic to your country.
